

Letter from Executive Headteacher, Sarah Jarman

#### **Dear Parents and Carers,**

As we hurtle towards Christmas, it is time to reflect upon the wide range of opportunities that have been open to our children and families this half term.

The annual cross country event took place for children in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 once again this term. The children selected, were required to run the 1500 metre long distance track, alongside competitors from other local schools, with their peers and staff cheering them on from the sidelines.

This was no easy feat, with children tackling the uphill stretch with grit and determination. Each year group completed their run, ending with a smile on their faces and I was amazed to see that some of them were barely out of breath! It was a terrific effort from our children, who upheld our school values throughout the entire morning. We were delighted that a child from Year 4, Carlito, took the first place spot for the entire Year 4 cohort of runners. Carlito gained a golden medal for his efforts.













We are delighted with the interest and uptake for both our STEM and Latin clubs that began this half term. Students from The Perse are hosting these, and they have been in popular demand. So far in the children have put their skills of arithmetic and problem solving to the test, using this to start designing a robot that would be suitable for the differing environmental factors on the planets. They have even introduced some algebra into this and had to use a combined teamwork approach to achieve the goals they set for themselves. In Latin, the children have started to be able to hold basic conversations in Latin with each other and have used actions to remember certain phrases. The children were keen to tell me that 'salve' is the Latin for 'hello' to one person and that 'salvete' means 'hello' to a group of people. In particular the children have enjoyed learning about Herculaneum – a city buried when Mount Vesuvius first erupted.

As mentioned in the previous newsletter, the swimming pool at Queen Edith will be up and running again this year. The cost of maintaining and heating the pool for lessons is only increasing. We will therefore be requesting voluntary donations from families when swimming lessons are resumed to help us meet these costs. A block of lessons (usually 6-7 weeks) will be £10 per child with a maximum cap of £20 per family. Having researched local offers, we feel this is reasonable. More information will be sent to you about this, if your child is due to swim in the Summer term.

Our children delighted their audiences recently, as Key Stage 1 children, Reception children and Nursery children took to the stage to deliver their much anticipated Christmas performances. Children in the nursery and Reception brought smiles to the faces of their family members by singing a medley of festive tunes that were accompanied by actions they had learned.





They worked extremely hard to learn these songs, which will form their first memories of Christmas at Queen Edith. Children in Key Stage 1 reminded us of how important kindness is at this time of the year. We heard at tale based around a snowman character called Sammy, who needed the friendship of his valued peers to feel welcomed by others.

Our children performed with the upmost zeal and I hope that for anyone who attended, they thoroughly enjoyed seeing their child/ren do their very best. Staff at the school worked very hard to ensure that the children did each performance justice, so thank you to all of them for their tireless work.









We hope that you enjoy reading this newsletter and would like to take this opportunity to wish you a peaceful and enjoyable Christmas break with loved ones. Thank you once again for your ongoing support and in playing your part in making Queen Edith a place where children enjoy their learning.

Please note that following the Christmas break, the Spring term starts for children on **Tuesday 7th January 2025**. The school will be closed to pupils on Monday 6th January, due to a training day.

#### PE


Children need plain black shorts, a white t-shirt and plimsolls/trainers. Depending on the weather, children will also need a tracksuit and trainers for outdoor games lessons. Children will continue to arrive in their PE kits, when it is their PE day.

#### **Jewellery**

Jewellery may not be worn in school. The only exceptions are watches, studs for pierced ears, and cultural or religious adornments, which must be removed during lessons involving physical exercise. If such items cannot be removed, the individual is not prepared in an acceptably safe way and cannot continue as is, so must take part in modified activity. The school will not accept responsibility for removing or storing studs. Long hair should be tied back for PE and DT activities.

#### **News from the Governing Body**

We have had to say goodbye to a few Governors this term, but I am glad to say we have been able to welcome a number of new faces to the Governing Body. Richard Baldwin joins us from AstraZeneca with a wealth of experience in finance. Dr Phil Kirkman is Director of the PhD in Education at Anglia Ruskin University and has many years of experience in secondary education. Marsha Merchant was coopted onto the Governing Body at our meeting on 2nd December: she is a parent at Queen Edith has wide experience in finance and accountancy. Ana Toste Rego is our new elected Parent Governor for Queen Edith; she has experience in scientific research as well as voluntary work with young children. The breadth of experience of our Governing Body is a tremendous source of strength and I am delighted to have such a strong injection of talent. They all very warmly welcomed.

You will be aware that a combination of financial pressures and a downfall in the birth rate has meant we have had to reduce Queen Emma to one-form entry for this year and next; we hope that the expansion of the city will allow the school to go back to two-form entry and we are keeping a close eye on the developments in our area. Staff have managed the change very successfully but we continue to monitor the impact of the change on all aspects of the children's learning and experience.

In line with the government's drive to raise attendance nationally, the Governors recently approved a new <u>Attendance Policy.</u> Many parents have queries about when they can legitimately take children out of school, when they can't and what the consequences might be if they do. You will have heard many times about the crucial importance of attendance, which includes arriving for school on time, and the serious impact a poor attendance record can have on a child's future prospects. I would encourage you to have a look at the new Attendance Policy, which is posted on the Federation website and where I hope you will find answers to any queries you might have.

As the term draws towards its close, on behalf of all the Governing Body I wish you all a Happy Christmas.

In line with the DfE Statutory Guidance (in force from 19th August 2024) we offer a supportive, stepped, attendance approach. We will offer a welcoming ethos with high expectations for all. We will assess data to identify absence trends & use preventative discussions/meetings with families to listen, understand & support to remove barriers. Where needed, we will formalise support to nurture improvement with Attendance Contracts & as a last resort we will consider intensifying support &/or enforce legal sanctions.

**1st Offence** (after 19th August 2024) of <u>Term Time Leave</u> &for <u>Irregular Attendance</u> (10 sessions of Unauthorised Absence or more) = Fine of £180 per parent, per child if paid within 28 days. If paid within 21 days fine is reduced to £80 per parent, per child. **2nd offence** within 3 years (from 19th August 2024) = Fine of £160 per parent, per child payable within 28 days, no reduction available.

3rd offence within 3 years (from 19th August 2024) NO PENALTY NOTICE considered. The case will be presented to Magistrates Court under s444(1) or (1a) of the Education Act. If found guilty, a fine of up to £2500 per parent, per child can be issued. Convictions for s444(1a) offences will show on DBS record.

### STEP 3 - Formalised Support

Where absence continues & initial support needs to be increased an Attendance Contract (AC) will be offered to formalise support. This is a 3-6 month nurturing plan of improvement to prevent further escalation. Achievable & individual targets will be set & reviewed regularly. Medical &/or other information will be actively sought at this point if required to work collaboratively with you & other agencies. An AC can run alongside other meetings e.g., TAF meeting.



#### **Bumblebee (Nursery)**

This half term the nursery children have been learning the traditional story of the Little Red Hen. They have been using flour to make their own gloop, play dough and bread rolls; they have made a range of art work relating to farm animals and have explored animal sounds and animal vocabulary.





We have also been learning about the season of winter. We looked for signs of winter and took our own photos in the garden. The children have been learning about the celebration of Christmas. They have enjoyed decorating the nursery and have been busy making and decorating their own cards. We have been practising songs and poems and we are looking forward to sharing them at our Christmas celebration.

Children have been investigating light and dark as we think about seasonal changes. They have been looking through different equipment to see how it changes what they see and thinking about nocturnal animals. They have been talking about healthy bedtime routines such as keeping clean and brushing teeth. Children have been acting out the rhyme 'Ten in a Bed' in the role play area and creating stars and night time scenes in different ways. We have also thought about how the moon changes during the month and have created pictures inspired by Van Gough's painting, "The Starry Night'.

Reception children loved having a visit from the Animal Experience this half term. Our special visitors included a snake, a blue tongued skink, a barn owl, a bearded dragon and a tenrec.

The children asked lots of thoughtful questions about where the animals lived and what they ate. They remembered our previous learning about nocturnal animals and those that hibernate. Children had the opportunity to touch and hold the animals. They were all very sensible, waiting their turn and being quiet and gentle with the animals.

#### **Daisy (1.1)**


In Daisy class this half term, we have been busy exploring 2D shapes. We been finding in our environment and talking about their properties.

In History, we have been comparing old and new toys and thinking about how they are made and the materials they are made from. In PCSHE, we have been thinking of how to be a good friend and we thought of lots of fun and safe games we can play.




This half-term in English, Year 1 we have been looking at the 'The Way Back Home' by Oliver Jeffers. We enjoyed pretending to explore the moon with torches and then went on to write our own versions of the story making sure that we were using our capital letters, finger spaces, full stops and precursive handwriting.

In Science, we have been learning about different materials and their properties, and conducted an experiment to find a material best suited to making an umbrella for Jeremy the Giraffe.

This half term in Sunflower Class, we have been learning to add and subtract 2-digit numbers. We have explored a range of strategies to build our understanding, including practical methods using maths manipulatives like Dienes blocks, pictorial approaches such as tens frames and jottings and applying our knowledge of number bonds to 10. These strategies are helping us solve problems more efficiently and develop confidence in our calculations.

This term, the children in Dandelion Class have been exploring the question, "Why do Christians call Jesus a saviour?" They have learnt about the season of Advent and how Christians prepare for Jesus' coming in the lead-up to Christmas. The children enjoyed hearing the story of the Annunciation, when the angel Gabriel told Mary she would have a special baby, and revisiting the Nativity story. As part of their learning, they created beautiful Advent wreaths and made models of the Nativity characters, deepening their understanding through hands-on, creative activities.

This half term, the children in Year 3 started off back in Ancient Greece with an amazing experience day run by History Off The Page! Since then, we have been exploring some of the differences and similarities between Britain and France in Geography, and learning how to say the names of animals in French

This half term Robin class have been enjoying learning all about France in Geography. We have thought carefully about the human and physical features of the country and compared these to Cambridge. In computing, we have enjoyed learning how to communicate safely online and send emails via Purple Mash.

Our Art lessons have been a wonderful opportunity to explore Claude Monet's work and think carefully about how we can recreate these pieces of artwork. Over the last couple of weeks, we have been busy learning about persuasive writing. We designed a delicious festive treat to persuade people to buy!

This half term, Goldfinch Class have been making Flatbreads in DT to promote healthy eating. They have been able to taste test different types of breads and have compared how loaves of bread are made differently. They have been refining their cutting skills by chopping fruits and vegetables and thinking about how to use kitchen utensils in a safe and careful way. They have been thinking about different flavour profiles by deciding what ingredients might go well together and have been working as a team to decide which ingredients they want to bring in to enhance the tasting experience.





In Maths, we used our new knowledge of calculating with fractions to solve a jigsaw puzzle! Each of the pieces had to match with an equivalent fraction or calculation. This involved us working well with our partners and persevering.

As always, Year 6 are given the responsibility of creating Christmas Cards for all our support staff in school – to say a huge thank you for such a great job throughout the year. This year our theme has been origami and we created Santa and some Christmas stockings.


